

'Always **winter** but never **Christmas**'



Imagine the prospect of such a winter!

The winter months stretching ahead with nothing to look forward to, or to anticipate and really enjoy. No Christmas lights, no cards, no Christmas trees, no parties, Christmas songs or carols. And the 25th December being just an ordinary day; cold and in the middle of winter. It is actually very hard to imagine such a winter, particularly here in the northern hemisphere.

If you have read C.S. Lewis's *Nania Chronicles* and particularly 'the Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' you will know this is exactly what the white witch was trying to trick the four children of the story into believing. Nania was under her spell; it was cold, frozen, white with snow as in the depths of winter. Then Aslan the lion is introduced into the story and there is a hint of thawing. There is a visit by Father Christmas but it is Aslan, the lion, who makes all the difference and the children are slowly drawn to meet him. It is a highly symbolic story or allegory in which Aslan represents Christ.

Thankfully we do have Christmas every year, because at the centre of Christian faith is the conviction of the birth of Jesus Christ into the world, celebrated each Christmas.

This was no ordinary birth, it is seen and known by the writers of the Gospels and countless Christians right down through the centuries as nothing less than God entering this world as a human being. It is of course a mystery in the sense that Jesus Christ was conceived in the womb of Mary in a miraculous way and born into this world as fully human but also fully divine and coming from God. God in human form, God incarnate.

Once we have grasped this truth then the celebration of Christmas Day in the middle of winter is the 'most wonderful day of the year.' It is, of course, only one day although the Church has always tried to make it a festival of the 'twelve days of Christmas,' now sadly neglected in present day Britain.

Whether it is one day or twelve days, we need to take to heart the message of Christmas 365 days of the year. The Spirit of Christ, the Holy Spirit is with us throughout the year in whatever circumstances we face, in our own personal lives and the life of the world. We can try to think of it as 'always Christmas but never winter' in our hearts and minds.



Vicar's 'House for Duty' position.

The retirement age for clergy in the Church of England is 70. Our Vicar, Robert, by a special arrangement with the Diocese of St Albans has been given a further two to three years working in a part time role.

His working hours are now three days a week. Sundays and two other days which will be Tuesdays and Wednesdays. This is under an official arrangement called 'house for duty,' enabling clergy to work on this part time basis while remaining at the Vicarage.

The parish is still part of the Team with Radlett and Shenley and will continue to operate in the same way with all the Sunday services and pastoral services - Baptisms, Weddings, Funerals and offering pastoral care where it is needed.

The churches of Aldenham, Radlett and Shenley are united as a 'Team Ministry'. The clergy work together sharing responsibilities and information as well as taking services in times of absence. On the next three pages there is some background information about its origins and the people involved.

viewer to the table. It is also known as *The Hospitality of Abraham*, who is visited by three angels in Genesis 18 (though note his wife Sarah did much of the cooking!). What is clear is that the image depicts something good and of the divine nature in multiplicity. Being and working *together* is part of the very character of God.

On 22nd March 2005 an Order in Council was made in person by Her Majesty The Queen at the Court of Buckingham Palace, specifically concerning our very own villages working together. In that declaration, the churches of Aldenham, Radlett, and Shenley, were united into a single Team Ministry. A Team Council was created, made up of clergy, lay ministers, and Churchwardens. This Council meets to discuss matters of common concern and to coordinate resources and services across the three parishes, working together as one.


St. Paul was quite keen on working together, with lots of different skills being put to God's purposes across a wide area. He was a tent maker and part-funded the Church with this work. Paul relied on traders of cloth, ship owners, scribes, and homeowners to nurture the fledgling faith across the Mediterranean peninsula.

Across our Team there is a huge diversity of gifts and skills. We have accountants, artists, lawyers, medics, civil servants, children, theologians, maintenance people, parents, financial investors, administrators, historians, musicians, health and safety experts, carpenters – the list goes on!

Prior to ordination your clergy were variously: a waiter, an HR professional, a civil servant, a sandwich maker, a teacher, a bartender, a butcher, and a painter & decorator. You'll have to ask us which ones did which jobs!

St. Paul takes us further in saying that working together for the Gospel is like being many different parts of one body (1 Corinthians 12). Diversity and unity is a good and holy thing.

At this time of year I will be lighting the fire in the living room. I am always struck how coals ignite and burn so much hotter when brought close together, and so easily grow dim when pushed apart. Perhaps there is something of the Holy Spirit in that unity, the faith firing up inside God's Church as we rejoice in one another's gifts and our mutual faith together.

Robert Fletcher (Vicar of Aldenham Church)

I was brought up in Chalfont St Peter, Bucks but the church I remember most while growing up was St James, Gerrards Cross.

After leaving school at the age of eighteen, I started working in the shipping business, eventually becoming a shipbroker in the city of London. I worked there for about seven years before being asked to work in the Aberdeen office, with the offshore supply ships and business relating to the North Sea oil.

It was in Aberdeen that I started attending a church, St Devenick's, Beildside which was to change my life completely. I realised there was far more to the Christian faith than I had previously understood and I became increasingly more involved in the life of that church, to the point of realising that I needed to offer myself for ordination. It was a huge decision but in a sense it was made for me - this is what a calling into the church feels like.

I came south to study at Ridley Hall theological college in Cambridge and once qualified, I went to serve a first curacy at Chalfont St Peter, which off course was a huge surprise, having lived my formative years there. I then moved to Bushey to serve a second curacy which was to be a highly providential move in that I met my wife, Caroline at St James's Church.

We then moved to Welwyn Garden City where our two first children were born and in the year 2000 came to Aldenham where I have served as Team Vicar for the past 22 years. These have certainly been some of the best years of my life, living in such a beautiful place where our three children have grown up and within such a loving and supportive Church community.



Rev'd. Oliver Blease (Vicar of Christchurch, Radlett)



He grew up largely running around on other peoples' farms in Cheshire. He retired from his position as a rugby union scrum half when he got to university and saw that most people were as wide as he was tall. Following a degree in law he went off to Australia where he had a series of temporary jobs which brought him in close contact with the criminal underworld. In a barristers' chambers he provided research to counsel on anti-corruption, extortion, homicide, and terror-related offences. Later he worked for a cabinet minister responsible for prison reform, crime prevention, and anti-corruption.

All the while, God was quietly sowing the seeds of ministry. Oliver began as chief lightbulb changer at the Old Cathedral in Melbourne, and graduated to reading the lessons, leading prayers, and taking a course in preaching. As this vocation to ministry grew he moved back to the UK to care for a family member who had a long-term illness. A life in ministry was explored and tested further with the Church and after a few years he took a degree in theology at Oxford and completed a Master's degree at Durham whilst training for the priesthood at Ripon College Cuddesdon.

Following a joyful curacy in Royal Wootton Bassett the family moved mid-pandemic to Radlett, where Oliver is gradually learning to grow things, mainly dahlias and, God-willing, the congregation. He is married to Mariama, an educationalist working for a City Livery Company and also priest ministering in the diocese of London. Mariama chairs the board of Days for Girls UK, supporting women and girls around the world with access to menstrual products and healthcare information.

She is the author of *Inequality and Flourishing: A Theology of Education* (London: SPCK, 2022).

Rev'd. Sarah Marshall (Vicar of St. Martins Shenley)

For those of you who haven't met me yet, Hi! I'm Rev Sarah Marshall, the new vicar at St Martin's, Shenley and I've been in post here since mid-August, but only just moved into the Rectory in Shenley a couple of weeks ago!

I've come straight from my curacy in the Tring Team Parish, which was made up of 1 large market town church and 4 smaller village churches. Prior to my 'calling', my main career was spent working as a Human Resources Manager for telecommunications companies, during which time I also gained a Masters Degree in HR Management. I also studied theology and trained for priesthood whilst working full time in this HR role.

I'm married to Chris and we have two sons Samuel (13) and Noah (10). It probably goes without saying, but my family are truly wonderful, they've been so supportive and daily I thank God for them. Throughout this whole journey, moving schools (twice) and moving

home (three times), they've not moaned once and regularly help me out in services. They are my absolute rock.

So what can I say of my experience so far?... well 3 months in and I am loving it. The support, prayers and encouragement from the entire Aldenham, Radlett & Shenley parish has been wonderful and hugely appreciated. I'm also keeping myself pretty busy after also being appointed Assistant Dean of Women's Ministry in the Diocese of St Albans.

No MAP

We launch out again on another three year cycle, but think for a moment what it was like for those early Christians who certainly didn't have the luxury of a MAP. (Mission Action Plan)

Professor Gossip paints a graphic and sombre picture of what life was like for them.

"There'd be slaves with wounded self-respect being healed in a loving atmosphere where they were no longer someone's goods and chattels, even perhaps in a position of leadership in the church, some ordinary folk generous with what little they had (not many wise, noble or mighty were called) just undistinguished people facing a bleak, lonesome and perilous life – cut off many of them from their families by their new found faith, ostracised and left out, in their own home town from its life, out of step with those around them, irritating and exasperating them by their behaviour – a daft impossible lot, not worth bothering with – some were hostile and angry, people were cruel and human life very cheap, with grim possibilities always near, they faced their dangerous days with courage trusting in their saviour".

Compare that with the comfortable lives we all lead!

ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY MURDERED



The name Archbishop of Canterbury doesn't usually engender great passions in the human breast, but in 1381 it did. After years of very poor government the populace rose in rebellion. The Prior of Bury St Edmunds was murdered in his own priory and a mob under the leadership of Wat Tyler entered London, captured mild Archbishop Sudbury, the Chancellor of the unpopular government and seen as its figurehead, took him to tower hill, beheaded him and placed his head over tower bridge. In time order was restored and those deemed responsible for the rebellion met their various fates in the assize presided over by the notorious judge Jeffries.

News travelled very slowly in those days and how long it took to reach Aldenham is anyone's guess. What would life have been like there at that time? The church would have been the focal point of the village and the impoverished priest, an important person, would have been a leader of the community. Church services would be in Latin which no-one, not even the priest, understood, as a consequence he would probably have mumbled the service. Everyone attended confession.

So how did people learn their faith? The walls of the ancient church (it must have been Norman with small windows) would have blazed with frescoes depicting scenes from scripture and the lives of the saints. Most prominent of all in bright colours would have been the last judgment with paradise opening for the good and flaming hell with devils tormenting the naked damned. Travelling friars, often good preachers, brought the faith alive for those who came into contact with them. But it was all against a back ground of pardoners selling pardons "hot from Rome", sham relics supported by episcopal letters from the bishops recommending their wares, friars keen to give pardons for money or a good meal. Bishops neglected their dioceses which were in a deplorable condition and devoted themselves instead to the service of the state. If rectories stood empty or occupied by persons guilty of scandalous behaviour or underpaid substitutes, nothing was done about it. Gone was the religious zeal of the monasteries, the monks lived comfortable lives of the well to do. The church owned a third of the land in England, but used it for its own good, not for the benefit of all.

Against this back ground the church surprisingly conferred on mankind a vast and lasting benefit by filling England with great cathedrals, minsters, abbeys and churches of outstanding beauty. Through elaborate tracery, huge windows and marvellous stained glass, light poured into the buildings offering for posterity structures of outstanding beauty which would stand to the lasting praise and glory of God.

Aldenham Village Residents Association

The Aldenham Village Residents' Association Committee has continued to implement the plan, which was agreed with Residents in the spring. We have responded to the Hertfordshire County Council's plans for parking restrictions along Church Lane, and are awaiting the outcome. It appears that the feedback from Village residents was largely negative, and the Council is having a re-think.

I am very pleased to report that, after representations from the Association, the County Council has installed road signs welcoming visitors to Aldenham Village at the 2 ends of Church Lane.

Aldenham is a beautiful village and it has a unique and historic character and place within the parish of Aldenham. We look forward to the Association making a positive contribution for the wellbeing both of Aldenham residents and the wider community.

More news on the Double Yellow Lines throughout the village!

As reported in the last issue and separately by email to members of the church and villagers the proposal for yellow lines throughout Church Lane is not finalised yet.

A notification from the Council saying they were going to implement the scheme met with immediate reaction from villagers and church alike. No reference was made to all the many objections that had been raised or the results of the 'survey' which was at best disappointing.

More objections from us all, Councillor Clapper and Oliver Dowden MP, have resulted in a further hold on the project with a promise of a proper consultation to find a good compromise to the 'problem'.

The church does acknowledge there maybe a need for a small area of the road to have restrictions of some sort but not the overkill that is suggested.

We can only hope for a sensible outcome to this in some modified form.

The church boiler project.

The Installation

The installation of the new boiler is well under way now in the crypt, new flue mounted outside and a new water supply run as well from the refreshment area at the back of the church.

There have been one or two hitches of course but mostly overcome by the excellent engineers from the installation company.

We have also had to dig a trench around the church for a water supply to be fed from the refreshment area which has caused a few problems finding the entry into the crypt. A much bigger trench will be dug for the gas installation from the road. This will come under the boundary wall and into the terminal box which will be located behind the sign board near the West door. From there it will go under the path and into the crypt following the access made for the water supply.

The biggest hold up is with the Gas supply. Having dug up some of the road the supply pipe was not where it should have been and Fulcrum have gone away to apply for a road closure to connect us and the Manor House next door at the same time. This may take some time and at the time of publishing



we are still waiting!

Fortunately the old boiler is still working so we are having to top up the

oil carefully to keep it going. The mild weather so far has helped of course!

News from the tower.

There were two unexpected pieces of work in the tower this year.

Firstly, checking the bells before the peal for the Queen's Jubilee, it was found that one of the pins, that hold a clapper in place, had sheared into two. Half of it had come out onto the belfry floor.

This was the Tuesday of the week of the two Jubilee Bank Holidays, Thursday and Friday. A trip to Loughborough and Taylors Foundry was called for to have it mended and refitted in time for Saturday. This was achieved and a well struck peal was rung by a visiting band.

The other event causing extra work in the tower was the death of the late Queen Elizabeth II.

If we are asked to ring for a funeral, there is a choice of open or half muffled ringing. Some ask for open ringing in celebration of the person's life while others prefer the more sombre sound of half muffled ringing. The latter is when a leather pad (shown in picture), is tied to one side of the clapper to give a soft sound, like an echo. For a Monarch's funeral it is strongly suggested that fully muffled ringing, with the tenor bell only half muffled be rung.

I was at the preview night of the Art Festival when the death of the Queen was announced to all present. The first action was to raise the flag to half-mast and then toll the tenor bell 96 times, one note for every year of the Queen's life.

The following day was spent applying the two muffles per bell, except the tenor, to allow for full muffled ringing for the duration of the period of national mourning. The sound produced is strange as only the one note of the tenor bell is really heard. Personally, having heard fully muffled ringing, I will not be sorry to never hear it again. Half muffled ringing is so much more distinct in the sound that it produces.

If you know of anyone who wants to come and see what we do, please tell them to get in touch with Ken or myself. Bell ringing is open to all and is fun - and good exercise!


