'Times of departure are times of disclosure'

'Times of departure are times of disclosure'

I'm not certain where I heard these words but they seem to ring true. It is time for me to 'depart' from Aldenham. Having been Vicar for 24 years, the time has come to leave the parish for retirement. When I arrived in January 2000 to take on the



position, I knew it would be for the 'long haul' but I never envisaged this long! There are certain advantages staying in the same post for a long time, especially the continuity and being able to really get to know one's church congregation and the wider community. I have 'travelled/accompanied' so many and been with them at very significant times in their lives, not least the 'rites of passage' Baptisms, Marriages and end of life through to funerals. These have been some of the most joyful and saddest times in which I have been privileged to share. In these times and moments that there has been 'disclosure' at the deepest level of our human lives; to have been part of them has brought such rich and diverse memories.

One of the most difficult parts of being a Priest and Vicar is that much of the time is spent dealing with the spiritual which cannot be seen. It is impossible to quantify/ measure the results of ones work and ministry. It's not about numbers who attend services, nor the finances of the church, though the church cannot exist without them. Church records and numbers are recorded every year and trends can be seen, but in the end the 'kingdom of God' cannot be measured and is infinitely larger than faith communities . What can be seen and observed is how people's lives are changed for the good, especially through their contact and connection with the church. This change is often the result of Christian worship in all its various forms, and it has been an honour to lead the services here at Aldenham for all these years. I will really miss being part of the worship, which has so often 'disclosed' the glory of God in our midst.

Prayer is another area that cannot be measured or quantified and it has always been a vital part of being Priest and Vicar. I hope that over the years I have helped people to pray. I have always tried to make it a priority, especially in encouraging 'contemplative prayer' and 'retreats' as a way of 'drawing close to God as He draws close to us.' God disclosing and revealing Himself. At its heart Christianity is a 'revealed' religion, as God in Christ comes to us.

The best parting words I can leave you with are 'Fare Well in Christ.'

My last service will be Sunday 26th May, 6.30pm Evensong at which the guest preacher will be the Right Revd Jane Mainwaring, Bishop of Hertford.


NEWS AROUND THE TEAM


⇒ FROM ALDENHAM

Sunday school or Children's church, as we are now calling it, has started well. We have a really good group of leaders who are keen to provide children with fun activities based on Christian stories from the Bible. With financial help from the Education fund, new resources and equipment are being purchased which will make it ever attractive to a growing number of children.

Christmas services were well attended. The Christingle service on Christmas Eve as, as always, a full church and it's always so good to see children and parents who have had either Christenings or Weddings or been involved in some way in previous years, come back to this service. It also raises much needed funds for the







The live streaming of Sunday and other services, weddings and funerals, is being appreciated by many who cannot attend. We now have six camaras which can view most areas of the building. We are also trying to work up a team of operators to work the system, so it doesn't depend on just one or two.

The heating system has finally been completed, after a very long and complicated process, particularly getting connected to the gas mains. We now have a brand-new boiler which is working well and much more efficiently than the old oil one and the oil tank has been removed as well. There are still some convector heaters linked to the system needing replacing which will add to the already increased heat in the building. The funds for this have been generously given by donors from the congregation, funds raised at events and a legacy.

Greetings from up the hill in Shenley! So, what's been going on here at St Martin's?.....

Well, as usual, quite a lot's been going on! Our little community is growing, encouragingly seeing small increases in numbers of attendance across the board.



We've been working to ensure our weekly services are consistent in style and feel, so that when new people attend they know what to roughly expect on any given week. Our church space is informal, we now have tables set up each week in a 'café style', enabling people to get to know one another and enjoy a cuppa during the service if they desire. For those who might not feel comfortable at tables, there are also two rows of chairs set up at the back where they can also sit too.

We're also making good use of our newly installed TV, with rolling notices on display to the public during the week when the church is open and we've also been using the TV and the informal church set up to host this year's team Lent course on a Wednesday evening.



On 1st March, the St Martin's Youth Group took part in the Watford FC Big Sleepout (see photo). We took our sleeping bags, jumpers and extra socks to join hundreds of other groups in raising money for four local homeless charities. We arrived at 7pm on the Friday evening and left at 7am the following morning – it was quite an experience, and what's even better is that our team raised around £700 for the cause, which contributed to the £50K

raised overall – we are very proud of our young people.

In terms of our church buildings, it's been a challenging start to the year. Our vestry floor is collapsing, and we needed the roof replacing over the parish rooms, which coincided with the heaviest downfall of rain we've seen for some years — so it's been a little soggy! However, what this has led to is the expediting in installing our accessible toilet. We're currently awaiting the faculty sign off from the diocese, however some of the clearing ground work is underway, so watch this space for developments.

With regards to our other groups/events, we continue to see an increase in Soup Lunch attendance, along with the Under 3s group, the Breakfast clubs and our newly introduced Sunday Club for children during our 10am service (however this has had to take a slight break due to the building work).

That's probably enough from me – want to know more? Then please do pop on up to St Martin's and experience for yourselves what we're up to.

FROM RADLETT

In Radlett we continue to grow in number and depth of faith, following the priorities of our Mission Action Plan: children and families, deepening discipleship, ministry amongst the elderly.

We have begun a new Children's Church session during the service, held every third Sunday. Volunteers teach about the theme / Bible reading of the day, and the children have fun making artwork and crafting. It is wonderful when they report back to the congregation at the end of the service on what they have been up to. The Youth Choir continues to grow with regular new enquiries. Our Confirmation group for this year's

service (with Bishop Jane, Thursday 9 May, 7.30 pm at St. John's Church) has 9 children and 4 adults in preparation classes. These classes after church have been great fun, with a mixture of games and conversation, always with sandwiches and doughnuts of course!

Our four local schools have been in church this term for services and to explore the sacred space, and separately I have been giving talks and assemblies in each of their schools as well. In addition, this term I have been giving talks on the Christian faith to the Sixth Form of Yavneh College in Borehamwood. Our new venture of 'Sunday Fun Day' — a lively service with refreshments and activities before we head into church - has proved very popular and attracted new families to join the church.

In Lent we welcomed the Dean of Westminster, The Very Rev'd. Dr. David Hoyle, to his old parish



to give the annual Lent talk to the Churches Together group. On 24 March we were delighted to welcome John Hayes as our new Authorised Lay Minister. Our monthly Feast & Faith Bible study is still going strong, with usually 11 members attending. Our Saturday morning Bible study group 'ReConnection' also continues, alongside other Bible study groups throughout the week. Every few weeks we have a joint coffee morning with Radlett Reform Synagogue, and this will continue on a monthly basis from April.

We have appointed a group to review our care of older church members. A large project emerging from this will be the formation of a Pastoral Care Team, responsible for ensuring no one is 'left behind' in any sense, that all are offered visits at home including for Communion, provided lifts including to church, and that everyone is fully cared for.

At St. John's we were delighted to welcome the diocesan Racial Justice Action Group, including Bishop

Richard, for their annual meeting and away day on Saturday 2 March. St. John's now has a large number of regular hirers including the

Strictly A Capella choir, the Radlett Musical Theatre Company, Brownies, martial arts, Singing

Circle, zumba, and of course our own Tuesday Toddlers each week.

Looking ahead, we have booked a Pilgrimage to Canterbury Cathedral on 13 July. We

are planning a Churches Together summer picnic on Church Field on 21 July, where we intend to renew our Covenant to ecumenical ministry and mutual support between the denominations. Thanks to the hard work of our wardens we now have permission to go ahead with a

project to add solar panels to the Vision Hall. This year's summer Holiday Club for children and young families is planned for 6-8 August.

Easter through an artist's eyes

Have you seen a Stanley Spencer painting?

He was a twentieth century artist with a very distinctive style. Once seen, never forgotten! Most of his paintings were of people and scenes of Cookham, Buckinghamshire, where he lived all his life. He was trying to convey the spiritual dimension of life in the midst of familiar and everyday activities.

For many years a very large and well-known painting of his, 'The Crucifixion' hung on the front wall of Aldenham School chapel. It had to be sold to raise much needed funds. Many old pupils and staff members will remember the painting. It was a haunting, frightening portrayal of Jesus being crucified between two thieves, in a modern day setting of houses and rooftops. He shocked the Governors and pupils by painting the soldiers wearing Brewers caps and saying it was 'you' who nailed Christ to the Cross.

A truth about us all if we can accept it!

His painting of the Resurrection (see below) was inspired by John Donne's description of a churchyard being the holy suburb of heaven. He painted a country church and porch, surrounded by flowers, similar to our own church here at Aldenham, together with graves and vaults and leaning headstones. The newly resurrected people are emerging from graves to experience the joy pf their new Thameside paradise. The Christ figure is sitting in the porch, holding a baby in his arms with a father figure behind him. A baby as sign of new birth and a new order brought about by the resurrection of the dead.

Stanley Spencer, in these paintings, was trying to portray the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ as closely as possible. The Gospel accounts describe the extraordinary astonishment of the first disciples of the mysterious resurrection appearances of Jesus. For some they didn't recognise him but slowly the truth dawned on them in different ways and then they believed! We can trust the Gospel accounts as being true and reflecting the difference it makes to our understanding of God and our lives in today's world.

BOILER NEWS

AT LAST!

We can report that the new boiler, heat exchanger and associated pipework is finally in and working well after many months of waiting and negotiation.

The result is a much more controllable and cost effective heating solution in our church. The biggest factor of this has been the enormous generosity of everyone in helping to achieve the amount of money needed to fulfil this project which amounted to £72,459 plus VAT. Most of the VAT we were able to claim back and along the way there were additional costs for the installation of the gas supply as previously reported which all added to the bill.

It was definitely 'Out with the Old and in with the new' to great effect and congratulations to the Installers who have made the new pipework a work of art and helped us so much along the way and their patience while we sorted out the problems with the gas people!

The old boiler will remain in the crypt for posterity to treasure but the old oil supply has been sealed off and the tank removed from the churchyard, so no more worries about the oil disappearing overnight!

Thank you so much to everyone who contributes to this either directly through a donation or indirectly by supporting our coffee/concerts, Art Festivals or other fund raising we have done over the last three years.

There is just one small matter of the four convector heaters that run off the system in the church which now the new system is running are clearly showing their age and in need of replacement before next winter. Always something!

WHY NOT READ THE BIBLE?

Jesus seems remote, irrelevant and ineffective in the greatly changed and challenging world of this century. What can St Paul with his complicated and difficult to understand letters possibly say to us meaningfully to-day? Indeed, does religion matter at all?

The bible seems to many people to be a bewildering jumble of history, laws, sermons, family trees, love poems and much else. But it is a vitally important story of a people who survived immense disasters which threatened their extinction and who managed against terrible odds to defy the stupidity, brutality, incompetence and destructiveness of great empires. Their voices still speak to us over time with important things to say. Theirs is the whole range of experiences from great joy to utmost despair.

They alone try to make sense of life. They ask does life itself have a meaning? If so, what is it? What is worth living for? How do we live successfully and meaningfully in life? They get the questions right and in working out the answers discover how to be open to the presence, love, guidance and inspiration of God which makes all the difference.

The story begins around 1250 BC, two groups of Israelite tribes are settled in Palestine, the other in Egypt where the Egyptians are forcing them to build imperial cities. Under their chosen leader, Moses, a few thousand of them escape crossing the desert and eventually meeting up with their kinsmen in Palestine where they settle. Theirs is a loose federation of clans separated by the Canaan cities which included Jerusalem.

Somewhere around 1100BC their world is threatened by the arrival of the Sea People, landing in high prowed boats, highly trained soldiers with chariots and iron weapons. They establish themselves in coastal cities. Trouble comes when they start to expand inland. The Israelites organise themselves and fight under the brave but erratic Saul who dies in battle. His successor David wins a series of brilliant battles and makes a new kingdom absorbing all the inhabitants in Palestine into it. But beneath the surface the bitter jealousies and mistrust between the northern Israelite clans and the southern ones simmer. David endures two rebellions in his kingdom during his reign, on his death his son Solomon succeeds him and finds he can only hold his kingdom together by means of standing army. On his death the northern clans rebel and form a rival kingdom.

The fate of the north and south kingdoms is sealed by the rise of Assyria to immense power. The north was completely wiped out in 722BC and the south in 586BC. But this time by the Babylonians, the successors to Assyria, the leading citizens were taken away into captivity in Babylon and Jerusalem with its temple destroyed. Out of the sense of failure and dereliction comes the assurance that God cares for them and gives them the strength and courage some seventy years later to return and begin the daunting task of rebuilding Jerusalem and the temple.

In the background is the belief that someone will one day come from God and restore Israel to its former glory. When he comes, however, he isn't at all the person they expect.

The New Testament is the story of one man, Jesus, his three public years, His execution outside Jerusalem and his amazing effect on his followers. Through an ever-growing circle of followers there comes into being a fellowship of great joy and certainty that although dead, Jesus is still with them spiritually and is the son of God.

This then is the story of the bible, one of the great books of the world. It is a book available to all. Its news is for everyone and its truths for everyone. A means of living happily and successfully in the uncertain times of to-day.

Christianity! True or False?

I don't know about you, but from time to time I have to take a hard look at what I really believe. I have a lot of sympathy with doubting Thomas who wouldn't believe Jesus had really risen from the dead until he had actually placed his hands on Jesus's wounds. (A gruesome thought.) A week later he got his chance and that clinched it for him. But the disciples weren't convinced either, when they first saw Jesus, they thought they were seeing a ghost. How did he convince them that it was really him in the flesh? He simply asked them for something to eat and what did they give him? Broiled fish and honey comb, a curious meal, which he calmy ate in front of them, perhaps with an amused smile on his face. As we all know ghosts don't eat. So, these facts tend to reassure me.



Then I think of the most meticulous examination of the documents by generations of experts whose conclusions uphold the substantial accuracy of the Gospels. Then there are those amazing words of Professor C. H. Dodd "The more critical our examination has been, the more sure we become that here is a real Person in history, many sided, often perplexing, certainly too great to be reduced to any common type, and not fully intelligible to us, but for all that unmistakeably individual, strongly defined in lines of character and purpose, and challenging us all by a unique outlook on life. Browning was right,

That one Face, far from vanish, rather grows,

Or decomposes but to recompose.

After the discipline of historical criticism we do know Jesus better and whatever was faulty in the traditional Christianity that has come down to us, or in our apprehension of it, is confronted afresh with the Reality which started it all."

Finally, I think that the writers of the Gospels were very honest men whose every wish was to be accurate in what they wrote. Why wouldn't they?

My personal experience last November brought home to me how valuable a tool a mobile phone can be.



I was on a long bridle path between roads at each end, but difficult to describe exactly where by any other means. The call handler took the three words and stated 'I know where you are' and proceeded to send an ambulance crew to recover me.

So having the 'What3Words' app, with the mass of identifiable 3mtr by 3mtr squares it contains, means pinpointing a casualty is relatively simple and time saving. The emergency services state that using 'What3Words' saves time on every 999 phone call they receive.

I would strongly recommend it, it certainly helped my situation.
